Double Feature: 50th Anniversary! PSYCHO, 1960, Universal, 109 min. Dir. Alfred Hitchcock. Lovely embezzler Marion Crane (Janet Leigh) takes refuge from a storm at the Bates Motel, presided over by Norman Bates (Anthony Perkins), a seemingly innocuous fellow living with "Mother" in a nearby mansion.

SPELLBOUND, 1945, Walt Disney Co., 111 min. Dir. Alfred Hitchcock. When bespectacled psychiatrist Ingrid Bergman discovers Gregory Peck is not a famous visiting shrink but in fact a traumatized amnesiac, she begins to fall in love with him. But is Peck a victim of circumstance or a missing doctor's killer?

Sunday, May 9 - 7:30 PM HITCOCOCK
Double Feature: SHADOW OF A DOUBT, 1943, Universal, 108 min. Dir. Alfred Hitchcock. Teenager Teresa Wright's romantic illusions about her beloved Uncle Charlie (Joseph Cotten) are gradually shattered by the growing suspicion that he may be a diabolical serial killer.

STAGE FRIGHT, 1950, Warner Bros., 110 min. Dir. Alfred Hitchcock. Jane Wyman plays a struggling actress who hides hide fellow student Richard Todd when he's accused of killing his lover's husband. Marlene Dietrich co-stars in this murder mystery set in the world of the theater.

Double Feature: STRANGERS ON A TRAIN, 1951, Warner Bros., 101 min. Dir. Alfred Hitchcock. A chance encounter on a train between tennis champion Guy (Farley Granger) and charming psychopath Bruno (Robert Walker) triggers an unstoppable race toward double murder.

Friday, May 14 - 7:30 PM PETER WELLER IN PERSON
Peter Weller's otherworldly command of the screen made him a science-fiction film icon. Perhaps best known for his role as resurrected cop-turned-cyborg in the dark and satirical ROBOCOOP franchise, Weller has demonstrated a flare for surreal delirium in David Cronenberg's NAKED LUNCH, for pitch-perfect cordonic confidence in THE ADVENTURES OF BUCKAROO BANZAI ACROSS THE 8TH DIMENSION, and for world-weary astuteness in SCREAMERS, the chilling adaptation of Philip K. Dick's short story "Second Variety."

Double Feature: ROBOCOOP, 1987, MGM Repertory, 102 min. Peter Weller stars as a murdered Detroit police officer who is brought back to life as an unstoppable cyborg cop in director Paul Verhoeven's action-packed satire.

SCREAMERS, 1995, Sony Repertory, 108 min. Dir. Christian Duguay. The year is 2078, a time when self-replicating killing machines called Screamers have evolved far beyond their inventors' intentions. Peter Weller is a military commander who has to lead his few remaining soldiers in a battle against the Screamers, whose ability to resemble human beings makes them extremely formidable enemies. Relative unknowns Sam J. Jones and Melody Anderson play Flash and Dale, but the supporting cast is full of heavyweights, including Max von Sydow, Topol and Timothy Dalton. Double Feature: 40th Anniversary! ZABRISKIE POINT, 1970, Warner Bros., 112 min. Director Michelangelo Antonioni follows the mind-expanding odyssey of two youths on the run from the police after a violent student demonstration. Their surreal adventures in the California desert climax in slow motion apocalypse to the strains of Pink Floyd. IF... 1968, Paramount, 111 min. More than any other film of the era, IF... perfectly represents the international spirit of youthful rebellion in the late 1960s.
